In the days leading up to Tu B'Shvat (which was on Monday 17th January) Mrs Hoffner was piloting a programme all about Tu B'Shvat – teaching classes on the pasuk comparing person to tree, part of a project to do with discovering who we really are. The runup to Tu B'Shvat was fantastic, but the actual event was even better!

Taking place during period 1 and 2 on Monday morning, the event happened in the hall and there was a carousel system. There were several different stations and a Kahoot to do with Shmitta. Mrs Hoffner also gave a presentation on Shmitta before the exciting Kahoot!

One of the stations was run by Lani. Having lived in Israel herself, Lani taught us about Shmitta in the kitchen: the rules when putting Shmitta to practical use at home. We were told about the special bin for produce grown in Shmitta and had to sort food items into it. Lani's activity was incredibly interesting, so thank you, Lani! Another activity was writing a letter to a farmer keeping Shmitta. As this year is the year of Shmitta, we were told they could possibly be sent! Girls wrote about how farmers were role models, since they were so dedicated to keep Shmitta. We were also given maps of Israel and had to highlight the places with kedusha (as not all places are part of the Israel in the Torah). For example, Eilat – therefore Shmitta does not apply there.

Additionally, we made Shmitta farms out of several different materials and put 'hefker' signs on them. The sixth form also made us smoothies to celebrate Tu B'Shvat – big thanks to them for taking the time to do it!

The programme was very enjoyable and a great way to celebrate Tu B'Shvat!













Parshat Tezaveh

There is an obvious question that can be asked on last week's parsha Terumah which can be asked even more strongly this week on Tetzaveh.

Last week we saw Hashem command Moshe to build a Mishkan and instruct him to bring Korbanos and for Klal Yisroel to bring Gifts to Hashem.

This week, the sedra spends a lot of time going through the minute of detail on the Bigdei Kohen - the various items of clothing that the Kohen Godol as well as the Kohen Hedyot wore. Furthermore, the Torah gives us great detail on the Korbonas and various other aspects of the Avodah.

The question is one that Moshe asks and is as follows - how can a mere building contain the Shechinah? How can Korbonos be something Hashem desires? Why would a mere "Gift" from Klal Yisroel mean something to Hashem who is greater than time and space? Why all the detail? What difference does it make?

The Chofetz Chaim sees an answer to Moshe's question a simple yet powerful lesson -Hashem does not ask us to do the impossible or what is not unreasonable. Every person is obligated to do only what he or she can. As Shlomo HaMelech says in Koheles "All that you find within your ability to do, act upon it..."

The message for us should be clear. We shouldn't feel pressured or overwhelmed that we cannot do things to the very utmost. Our obligation is to do the very best we can do. We need to pull out all the stops in serving Hashem with Simcha - Ivdu es Hashem b'Simcha - and know that our obligation isn't just the things we do but the effort we put into it.

In this way, we will be doing Hashem's Will.
