D'var Torah

This week's D'var Torah is written by Adiela Levine, one of our Yavneh alumni who is currently studying in Michlalah sem.

7In this weeks parsha we are given the commandment of Lo Sachmod:

לא תַחָמָד בֵּית רַעַדְּ{ס} לא־תַחָמֿד אֲשֶׁת רַעָּדְּ וְעַבְדָּוֹ וַאֲמַתוֹ וְשׁוֹרְוֹ וַחַמֹּרֹוֹ וְכָל אֲשֶׁר לְרַעַדְּ: {פּ

You shall not covet your neighbor's house: you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox or ass, or anything that is your neighbor's.

How can we fulfil this commandment? Isn't it natural to desire what someone else has? The Ibn Ezra suggests a moshal that can help us understand this concept: No commoner ever thinks that he is going to marry a princess. He knows she's 'out of his league'—this occurrence is out of the realm of possibility for him. Even when she gets married, he doesn't feel jealousy as he never believed that this princess would ever be designated to marry him. The Ibn Ezra says, that an intelligent person understands that we are only able to acquire what Hashem wants us to acquire. If we are meant to have that car or that house, we would have it. Its human nature to desire something that we believe we can have, if we want it enough, but we don't desire things that we think are out of our league. When we remember that Hashem is in control of the world, we remember that everything we're meant to have, we will have. If it's not designated for us, we won't have it—its 'out of our league.'

The Ramban suggests another approach on how to fulfil this commandment. He quotes a medrash that parallels lo sachmod and veohavta leraicha kemocha. How do they connect? Rav Simcha Zissel explains, that when we see someone has a better car than we do and we want that car, the human emotion behind that desire isn't strictly driven by the want for the car, but it stems from the belief that I am better than them — why should he have something that I don't? If we loved our fellow as we loved ourselves, we wouldn't be jealous of them. We wouldn't be questioning who deserves it more, we'd just be happy for them. So, how do we practically follow this commandment?

We should try our best to implement these ideas into our lives. If we don't have that car, or that holiday, or whatever it is that we might think we deserve, it's because Hashem knows exactly what we actually need and what is best for us. We don't have this certain thing because it's not good for us to have it right now – otherwise we would have it. Having this perspective will help us to remove jealousy from our lives. Additionally, by building upon our Ahavas Yisroel through this commandment, we will IYH bring Moshiach very soon.
